Our Mission and Status

The mission of Carquinez Village is to build a community that provides social support, practical help, and referral assistance to older adults who want to remain in their homes as they age.

We are dedicated to enhancing the ability of each of our members to live full, independent, and fulfilling lives.

We're a charitable tax-exempt 50I C3 nonprofit (EIN: 47-4I33336) and a fee-based membership service organization.

Our History

In 2014, two women in Benicia had an idea. They wanted to join with visionaries around the country who were revolutionizing the experience of aging. They wanted to support their older adult neighbors who wanted to remain in their homes as they aged but needed assistance to do so. They wanted to provide social, cultural, and educational programs and activities to stimulate and enrich the lives of women and men in the final stage of their lives. They wanted to bring seniors together to enjoy the richness of learning and sharing, and they wanted to ensure that no one was isolated or alone as they aged.

They formed a steering committee of twelve passionate adults who worked for two and a half years to bring their dream to fruition. In doing so, they put Benicia on the map as a member of what had become known across the country as the "village movement." All villages are membership organizations with similar models and goals. The Benicia founders call their organization *Carquinez Village*. In April 2017 there were forty-five charter members.

Benefits Designed to Make a Difference in People's Lives

A community of volunteers is at the heart of the Village. They provide a set of everyday support services that meet different interests and needs and a circle of caring in times of need.

We offer an array of social, educational, and cultural programs that change throughout the year and inspire members to view life as one of opportunity and possibility.

Our members are part of a caring, dynamic, and engaged community of older adults. We have peace of mind knowing that we have created a low-cost strategy that saves money, reduces isolation, increases peace of mind, and nurtures each of us.

Who We Are Today

Carquinez Village is a vibrant and growing nonprofit that connects members with one another, delivers supportive services that enable many members to remain in their homes and use a range of programs and activities that provide stimulation, speakers, new experiences, and fun!

Today, we have over 100 members and nearly as many volunteers.

We are a member of Village Movement California, a statewide network of Villages seeking to transform the attitude of aging in California.

The **City of Benicia** supported our **Older American's** campaign in May by giving us mural space at the Community Center and a presence in the Senior Center; **Mayors** of both Vallejo and Benicia issued proclamations in recognition of this effort. **Libraries** gave us space to display a puzzle and provide flyers to interested community members.

In an ongoing partnership with **Touro University** our members assisted betatesting a new resource website. Newly minted Physician Assistant students practiced taking our medical histories to better learn about working with an older population.

American Red Cross volunteers installed smoke and CO2 monitors in member homes. CO2 monitors were provided by our local Pedrotti Ace Hardware. The **County of Solano** needed contact verification for the newly published *Solano County Resource Guide*. Our members stepped up.



Gas prices have caused a burden on our transportation volunteers. **Valero** responded quickly, providing gas cards to help us maintain this critical service for our members.


