President's Message

Have you noticed that the trees are in bloom? On one of my COVID-19 -permitted trips to the post office, I was blown away by all the white blossoms on the trees. When did this happen? It must be Spring. I sure am ready for all that spring symbolizes for me, a time of new beginnings.

Since early in the pandemic, Carquinez Village has had been focused on being a strong partner in the community.

On March 2nd Benicia will be hosting the 2nd dose vaccination clinic. Those who received their first vaccination in February will be returning at the same appointment time for their 2nd injection. Carquinez Village is honored to have been asked again to assist with organizing the call center and providing transportation.

Early in February the Village was asked by the League of Women Voters of Solano County to hold a "Listening Session" on Zoom highlighting issues of concern to older members in our Benicia/Vallejo community. The prioritized issues that were identified are: 1) Reversing Citizens United. (Corporate spending on political campaigns should not be viewed as free speech); 2) Women in Poverty; 3) Food Insecurity; 4) Affordable Housing; 5) Climate Change (effects on our local communities). Other issues that were identified but not ranked included educating young adults about voting; moving to universal mail- in voting; local and regional transportation; the increase in litter/dumping; racial inclusiveness; and air quality in Benicia.

Benicia Mayor Steve Young was our featured speaker in February; it was a well-received talk. We had a great turnout of 38 households via Zoom. In addition to sharing with us the city's pandemic relief efforts, he focused on some of the same issues that were identified in our listening session, including affordable senior housing, water, and climate change. He also spoke about the selection of former Benicia police department chief Erik Upson as Benicia's city manager and his "responsiveness to the city's issues". Mayor Young took questions from the audience and invited people to contact him with their concerns. If you missed the session, the recording of his talk is on our website.

Our events committee has come up with some great offerings for March. Check out the March 5th TED talk by Tim Urban "Inside the mind of a major procrastinator". Or if you don't get around to that one, join comedy writer and Olli instructor Martin Marshall for a special presentation "Gift of Laughter - Gilda Radner". Or you might want to join us for Happy Hour at the end of the day on a Friday.

I'm estimating it was a little over an hour from my front door until I returned.

Amazing!





Guidelines Regarding Transportation Requests

Advance Notice Required

Two-day notice if you are making a request for a ride Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday. Place your request by the previous Monday Morning. Three-day Notice if you need a ride or service on a Monday or a Tuesday. (We need extra time because the office is closed at the weekend. This allows for volunteer to be informed of requests and to respond.

Expenses

Members are responsible to pay for Tolls, batteries, parking fees etc. There is no 'tipping of drivers. Volunteers only cover the cost of their gas. It is part of their generosity and service.

Agreement regarding service

Volunteers agree to deliver their service for the time that the member requested. Extra time should not be added on spontaneously.

Attending Medical Appointments

We encourage you to request this support so include it on your service request so the volunteers are aware of it; however not everyone may feel comfortable doing this especially during this COVID-19 time)

Wheelchairs

Volunteers provide hands off, non-medical, non-acute services. Only consider wheelchairs if they fit into the back of the volunteer's car. In most instances it may be wise to consider using a wheelchair that belongs to your destination (a hospital or other medical locations)

How to Request a ride

Go to the Carquinez Village website www.carquinezvillage.org and find the 'New Service Request 'drop down menu. Or call the Supportive Services 707-741-1656 and leave a message and someone will return your call and seek to locate a volunteer for you. That volunteer will call you and introduce themselves and confirm the arrangements for your service. Here's hoping we can get back to more of a normal Life as we have the volunteers ready to serve you.
